

How are my results recorded?

Any credits you achieve will be recorded against your name and National Student Number (NSN). Learning Recognition (LR) credits will be calculated as part of results release in January 2021 and will count towards your NCEA. The LR credits will show in your Learner Login, but not on your New Zealand Record of Achievement as this records the qualifications, standards, and grades achieved.

Results released to universities and polytechnics

In January 2021, NZQA will send all Level 2, Level 3 and University Entrance results (authorised for release) to all New Zealand universities and some polytechnics to help these institutions process pre-enrolments. If you do not want your results to be released, you **must** tell your school. You need to check with institutions for limited entry programme requirements.

If you are going to study overseas, you should contact the institution(s) where you intend to study as early as possible. Make sure you understand their enrolment requirements, procedures and deadlines. Australian universities can access your results directly from NZQA systems, unless you have specifically requested that your results are not made available to tertiary institutions.

Thinking about doing digital exams?

Before deciding to enter a digital exam in 2020, consider if you are using a computer to learn and find out your school's plans for digital exams, including subjects.


Which subjects will have digital exams available in 2020?

Agricultural & Horticultural Science, Art History, Business Studies, Chinese, Classical Studies, Education for Sustainability (L2 only), English, French, German, Health, History, Home Economics, Japanese, Latin (L1 & 2 only), Media Studies, Psychology, Samoan, Social Studies, Spanish, Te Reo Māori and Te Reo Rangatira.

How do I get ready for a digital exam?

Along with the revision you would do for a paper exam, you need to get familiar with the digital exam platform and, if you are using your own device, check it is set up for a digital exam. Our Student Exam Hub (<https://www.nzqa.govt.nz/ncea/ncea/>) will help you 'Become familiar with digital exams' and learn about the platform. You can also find digitised past exam papers as well as the 'Digital Exams Device Check' to prepare your device.

How do I become a candidate for NCEA or NZ Scholarship?

You automatically become a candidate for NCEA when your school or kura first sends your entries to NZQA in March. As a candidate, you must follow all the Assessment Rules. If you are studying any courses with Te Aho o Te Kura Pounamu, or another provider such as a polytechnic, you must tell your school. That way all your results can be recorded on your New Zealand Record of Achievement.

Gaining NCEA Level 1, 2 or 3

NCEA Level	Requirements
Level 1	80 credits are required at any level (level 1, 2 or 3) including literacy and numeracy. Schools can explain the literacy and numeracy standard pathways they are using.
Level 2	60 credits at level 2 or above + 20 credits from any level The Level 1 literacy and numeracy requirements must also be met.
Level 3	60 credits at level 3 or above + 20 credits from level 2 or above The Level 1 literacy and numeracy requirements must also be met.

If you have questions about literacy and numeracy, talk to your school or kura.

In 2020, for every 5 credits you achieve, you are entitled to 1 additional Learning Recognition (LR) credit. Up to 10 LR credits can count towards NCEA Level 1 and up to 8 LR credits can count towards Levels 2 or 3. NZQA will count these credits towards the qualification you are closest to achieving. It is important you check the 2020 Examination Timetable (www.nzqa.govt.nz/timetable) as these dates have changed. Please also check with your teachers to see if you have exam clashes. Your school and NZQA can help you manage these.

Entry for the NCEA and NZ Scholarship is free of charge for Domestic Students.

Fees for International Students

International Fee-Paying students must pay the following amount to enter NCEA and/or NZ Scholarship:

- NCEA entry \$383.30 per candidate
- Each NZ Scholarship subject \$102.20 per subject

I am an International Student, how do I pay?

- Pay your fees to your school or kura. They will be able to tell you when and how much to pay.
- Your school will pay all the fees they have collected to NZQA by 31 October 2020.

Can I change where I will sit my external NCEA exams?

If there is a good reason why you cannot sit **all** your exams at your exam centre, then first talk to your school or kura. They will contact NZQA to discuss if this is possible.

What if I need help to sit my internal and external assessments?

- If you have sensory, physical, medical or learning difficulties, you may be able to get help with your internal and external assessments. This help is called Special Assessment Conditions.
- If you need help, your school or kura must apply to NZQA on your behalf to approve this help.
- If help has been approved, your school or kura should have already talked to you about this and arranged this for you.

How do I gain entrance to a New Zealand university?

University Entrance (UE) is the minimum requirement for getting into a New Zealand university. Many universities and other tertiary providers have further programme entry requirements so you will need to check with them as well.

To gain University Entrance in 2020, you will need:

- NCEA Level 3
- Three subjects at Level 3 made up of:
 - 12 credits each (*for 2020 only*), in three UE approved subjects
- Literacy - 10 credits at Level 2 or above, made up of:
 - 5 credits in reading
 - 5 credits in writing
- Numeracy - 10 credits at Level 1 or above.
